It is when we recognize the hope that we find through God that we can have the strength to stretch when we think we reached our limits. God does not grow weary even when we do.

While I see God as the primary source of our encouragement, we cannot forget to encourage and lift up each other. I believe that God works through us to help each other. In the days and weeks ahead as we work together may our strength be renewed by God.


Official Call to the 2019 Annual Meeting New Hampshire Conference, United Church of Christ

The members of the Annual Meeting Planning Committee invite you to come together, as the Gathered Conference, for the Annual Meeting of the New Hampshire Conference, United Church of Christ. Here is what you need to know:



What: The 218th Annual Meeting of the NH Conference of the United Church of Christ

When: Saturday, October 19, 2019

Where: Grappone Conference Center 70 Constitution Avenue, Concord, NH

THEME: The theme of our meeting this year is, "Step Up, Speak Out – from Complicity to Courage". The theme will be unpacked as we explore an adaptation of Deuteronomy 31:6-7, "Be strong, bold, and courageous as you lead...for God goes with you."

FEATURED SPEAKER: The Rev. Traci Blackmon, Associate General Minister of Justice & Local Church Ministries of The United Church of Christ and Senior Pastor of Christ The King United Church of Christ in Florissant, MO., will share reflections on her life work and focus on communal resistance to systemic injustice.

WORSHIP: Worship will not be "the thing we do to break up the business." Rather the liturgy of worship will guide and sustain the substance and structure of our time together as the Gathered Conference. As we celebrate past achievements, confess brokenness, and consider the shape, scope and substance of our blessed Conference ministries for the future, we will be doing so as a gathered body in worship. At the heart of our worship we will hear reflections by Rev. Blackmon; and personal stories from the Rev. Eric Jackson, President, Manchester NAACP; Kristin Forselius, Director of Education and Faith Formation at the Community Church of Durham; and a representative of the Immigrant and Refugee Support Group of the New Hampshire Conference.


There were other projects that the BORF addressed over the summer months.

SOME NEWS FROM THE WIDER CHURCH

To have a covenant relationship with the wider church seems especially reassuring for us during a time when our small rural church has to focus on an urgent matter of 'home maintenance' in order to protect and preserve the historical Meetinghouse that past generations of good stewards created and left in our care. The news from the wider church reassures us that during this time of increasing fear and suffering and hate that threatens the wellbeing and even the future form of God's beloved world, there are many, many people of our faith (together with those of other faiths and of no formal faith) who are confronting the causes of suffering and working to create ways of living that reflect the ways we learned from Jesus in Sunday School when we were children. We also can rejoice when we hear about others who are working to help and heal all who suffer, regardless of their status in the world. We can feel a little more hopeful for everyone's children and grandchildren when we hear about what some in the wider church are doing to heal and protect the air, land and waters around us. In the conversations we held in the Vestry months ago, we shared our hopes for reaching out to the world with more energy in the future. We can be reassured that those in the wider church will welcome our helping as we are able now, and with greater energy when our present work to protect and preserve our Meetinghouse has been completed.

UPCOMING EVENTS

There will be a regional *Ukama Pot Luck Supper* at the Pilgrim Congregational Church in Brentwood on Thursday evening, September 12th, and anyone who would like to hear about ways to re-energize our Ukama relationship with our sister church in Zimbabwe is invited to attend and meet with others who are in active partnerships.

The Neighbors in Need Offering for the UCC and the **World Mission Offering** for the AVC will be received on October 6th and is an opportunity to help those who are suffering from injustice.

Young people from around the world will be conducting a world-wide **Youth Climate Strike on September 20th.** Near us it will be held in Concord and Portsmouth. 2019 Church Vegetable Garden - End of Summer update

The summer weather this season was very good for gardens (though a little too hot for the gardeners) and we were able to provide an abundance of produce to share with the Church and community!

If anything was challenging....it was the choice of some of the tomato plants this year! An heirloom Roma type called "Amish Paste" was recommended and proved to be very unruly and not quite compatible with our small raised bed configurations! They

grew to about 8 feet tall and totally took over the paths etc. There was no stopping them other than some pretty severe trimmings! The fruit is very large (and rather ugly) but perhaps will make good bruschetta or maybe a pasta sauce. All I can say is that I am NOT going to plant these again next year!!! We will find a standard paste Roma that is a little better behaved!

We have also decided to repeat the "Taste of the Garden" that we started last year! It was a very nice event even though not as well attended as we would have liked! We are hoping that with less competition in town and more advertising that we can draw a larger crowd who would like to sample some delicious bites prepared with our veggies! We could use help from anyone who could prepare a dish or dessert and we will provide the vegetables. We also encourage all members and friends to attend this to support the effort and to be available to interact with other guests as many of us "garden folk" will be busy serving and refreshing the food.
